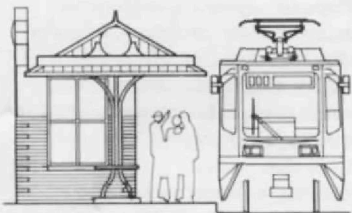

John Kaliski, former professor of architecture at the University of Houston College of Architecture, is an architect with Skidmore, Owings and Merrill, Los Angeles.

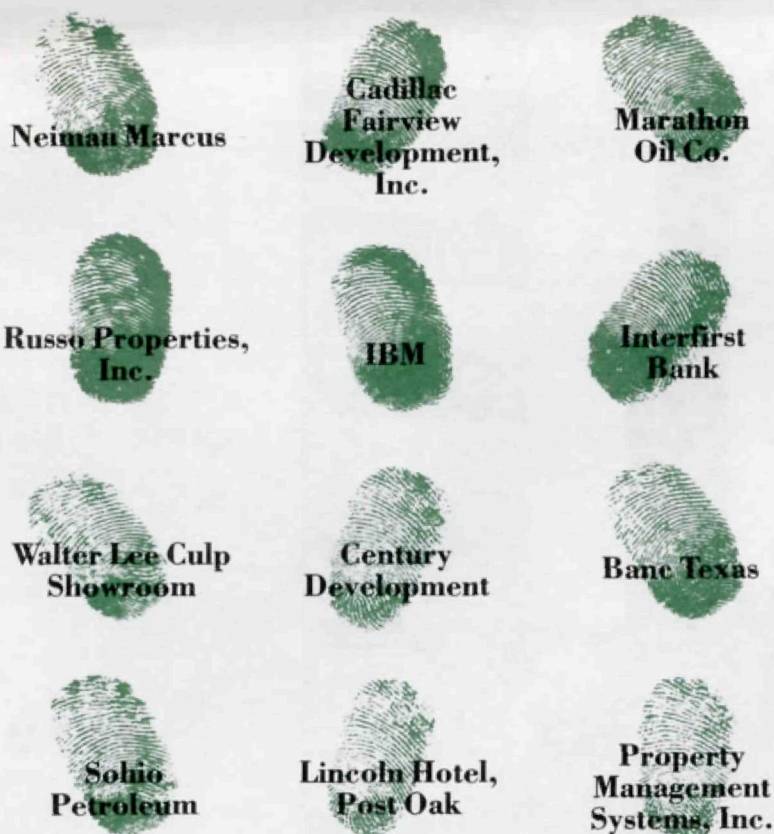
